Tim Loftus said it was his most difficult marathon this year, but despite heat, little wind and hilly terrain. the South Miami, Fla. runner set a new course record in winning the 1982 Island Marathon Sunday.

The 31 year old runner crossed the finish line in downtown Charlottetown in two hours, 32 minutes and 36 seconds to eclipse the old mark set in 1980 by Tom Olsen of N.S. in 2:34.51

Loftus led the whole way over the 26 mile-plus course from the National Park into Charlottetown.

"I felt ready for the race, I felt the course record would be broken and I hoped to break the 2:30 mark. So I'm happy by winning but a little disappointed at the time," said Loftus.

He said he didn't have many problems running the race although going downhill caused a few cramps. "We don't have hills in Florida so it was a little different," said Loftus who raced in the Marathon in 1980 and placed fifth. BEST RACE






